NOTICE

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that it is the intention of the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Timmins to pass the following by-law after due notice thereof has been published in accordance with the Provisions of the Municipal Act.

TOWN OF TIMMINS BY-LAW NO. BEING A BY-LAW to amend a certain portion of O'Neill Avenue within the Corporation and to permit the Corporation to lease or sell the portion of the said street as stopped up.

WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation desires to close and stop up a certain portion of O'Neill Avenue, a street within the Corporation.

AND WHEREAS the Council desires to have the right to lease or sell the portion of O'Neill Avenue so stopped up.

AND WHEREAS notice of the intention of the Council has been duly advertised as required by the Municipal Act and all persons who claim that their land would be prejudicially affected by this by-law and who applied to be heard have been heard by the Council.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED AS A BY-LAW OF THE TOWN OF TIMMINS as follows:-

1. That part of O'Neill Avenue as shown on Plan M-7 Cochrane described as follows: COMMENCING at the North East angle of Lot No. 44 according to Plan M-7 Cochrane, thence westerly along the South Boundary of O'Neill Avenue, a distance of sixty-three feet, three and three-fifths inches to the North West angle of said Lot No. 40 thence North twenty-nine degrees 05 minutes East along the West Boundary of said Plan M-7 Cochrane, a distance of twenty-five feet, four and one-fifth inches to a point in the North Boundary of O'Neill Avenue. Thence Easterly along the said North Boundary of O'Neill Avenue, a distance of sixty-six feet, seven and one-fifth inches to the South East angle of Lot No. 53, according to Plan M-7 Cochrane, thence South along the West Boundary of Bellevue Street, a distance of sixty-six feet to the point of commencement, a hereby closed and stopped up.

2. That the Corporation may lease or sell the portion of O'Neill Avenue so closed and stopped up.

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that any person who claims that their land will be prejudicially affected by the by-law and who applies to be heard, will be heard by the Council, in person or by his Counsel, Solicitor or Agent at a time to be fixed therefor upon the application to be heard.

Matheson And District News From Ansonville And Iroquois Falls

Nominating day for the Black River Township Area was the 26th of November. Those nominated for the Reeveship are as follows: Messrs. Leo Alarie, Matheson; Arthur Brightwell, Shillington; Andre Lapierre, Val Gagne. Both Mr. Brightwell and Mr. Lapierre declined to accept the nomination. Reeve Alarie was elected by acclamation and will be Reeve for the third time.

Those nominated for councillors were: Messrs. A. Boucher, Val Gagne, A. Brightwell, Shillington, J. Elliott, Holyre; Mrs. N. Elms, Shillington; Na. Gibson, Matheson; O. Ladouceur, Holyre; A. Rhodes, Matheson; G. Perreault, Val Gagne. Mr. Rhodes of Matheson withdrew in the hope that the former council would return by acclamation. This Mr. Rhodes explained would save the ratepayers a considerable sum. However, Mr. Gibson and Mrs. Elms would have withdrawn if those nominated were to divide so as to give those farmers in the Matheson district a representative, thus leaving one to represent Holyre and Val Gagne. Matheson district farmers have so far been left without a councillor, all those nominated qualified.

It was a very good meeting in that former councillors aired their grievances and expressed their opinions freely, especially Mr. Ladouceur. Of course, as in most cases one could classify it as constructive criticism at first, running to the ridiculous side before it was finished.

Reeve Alarie promised to serve residents of Black River Township as he has done during his former years as Reeve all those who have had the occasion to ask assistance from Mr. Alarie know he will fulfill his election promises. As for those running for councillors, they will be busy this week campaigning as the election is scheduled for Monday, December 6th, 1948.

The Township of Black River may, if elected, for the second time since its inception, be endowed with a woman on the Council. Mrs. N. Elms of Shillington has entered the race for the 1949 Council.

Mrs. Elms stated that her reasons for contesting the election were primarily the interest she takes in the community in which she lives. The high tax rate prevailing at the present time, coupled with the fact that the township finances are in a rather poor condition, make it plain that all is not right in the administration of the Township affairs. This situation has to be remedied and I wish to do my utmost to remedy it, quoted Mrs. Elms. It is apparent that the Township has not the necessary funds to do all the work but it seems that the distribution of what is done is not altogether equitable to the residents of the various parts of the Township.
