The Message Of Christmas

Christ the spiritual idea, becomes better understood. Man is revealed in all his primal spiritual perfection and grandeur, unlimited in goodness and joy, and God is glorified in peace and good will. This is the message of Christmas. - The Christian Science Monitor.
