Another link was broken from the chain of the Pioneers of Matheson in the passing of Mr. Daniel McRay Johnson, Sunday December 12th, at 3:30 p.m. in his 78th year. Born at Rivers Bend, Cape Breton, Victoria County, N.S. The late Mr. Johnson had been in failing health for over nine months.

Before moving to Matheson Mr. Johnson spent three years in Nipigon with Revellon Freres Company. In April 1907 he moved to Matheson with his wife and his three eldest children. While here Mr. Johnson carried on as Manager for Revellon Freres Co. until from 1916 when he purchased the business. An active member of St. Andrew United Church, the Odd-fellows and Rebekah lodges, also one time an active member of the Loyal Orange and True Blue Lodges.

In municipal affairs, Mr. Johnson served faithfully for a number of years as Mayor for seventeen years, he was only defeated once that was last year, 1947 by three votes. In lodges this year he was presented with a Fifty year membership Jewel by the I.O.O.F. in which lodge he held many offices, including that of District Deputy Noble Grand. In the L.O.L. he had been District Master, and Provincial Organizer for the Loyal True Blue. In politics, Mr. Johnson was a staunch Liberal working for that party in this district for many years.

Surviving are his wife, the former Lila Roy of Margaretsville, N.S., one daughter, Mrs. Robt. Tracy (Nelle) of Englehart Lawrence of Guelph, Wilfred of Chicago and Roy at home in Matheson, nine grandchildren, Wilfred, Daniel, Fred, Graydon, and Ronald of Guelph, Larry of Chicago, Anne Tracy Englehart and Barry and Lynne of Matheson.

The late Mr. Johnson rested at his home amidst banks of beautiful flowers and wreaths. The funeral service was held Tuesday Dec 14th. A brief service was held at the home prior to the service at St. Andrew United Church by the Rev. K. I. Cleator. In his comforting words, Rev. Cleator spoke of a few of the many good qualities and acts of kindness enacted by the late Mr. Johnson.

Interment was made at Hillcrest Cemetery, Matheson.
