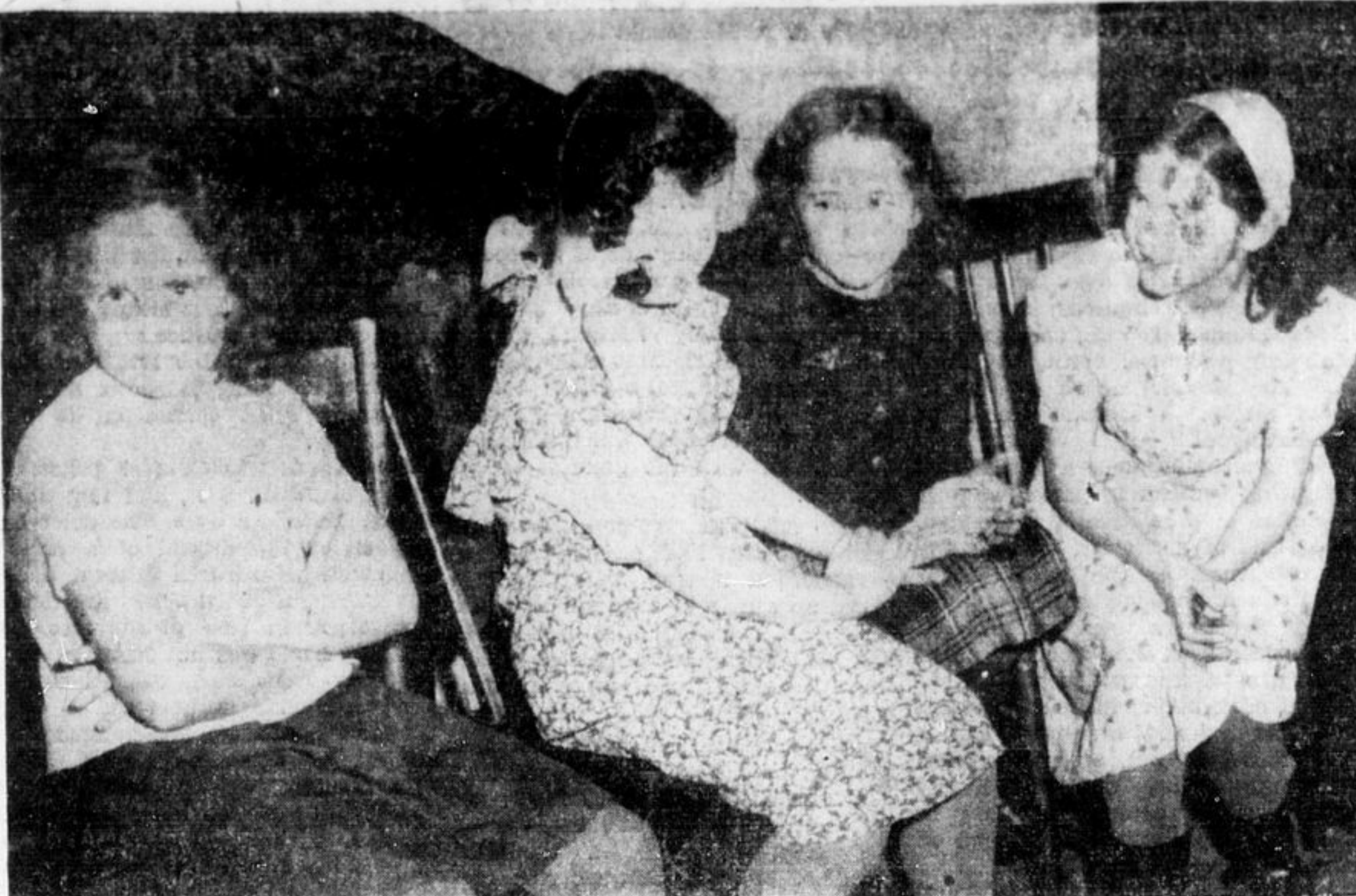
### Mission Band Children Enjoy Jolly Party

AIRCRAFT INDUSTRY COME- BACK — The aircraft industry, our industrial white-haired boy in wartime but a neglected orphan since, is staging a comeback, writes A. R. Williams in The Financial Post. The stimulant is defense. Plane-making is bound up inextricably with national security. If the worst comes to the worst, neither Ottawa, nor the industry will be caught napping as they were in 1939. Today this country has a much broader, sounder and more experienced nucleus around which the industry could expand rapidly. Various projects, most of them government-financed military undertakings, are under way. They involve at the moment something in the neighborhood of \$50 millions.



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
