A. David paid \$1 and costs for having defective lights, also H. Demers. G. Scarbo was adjourned one week on a charge of receiving stolen goods.

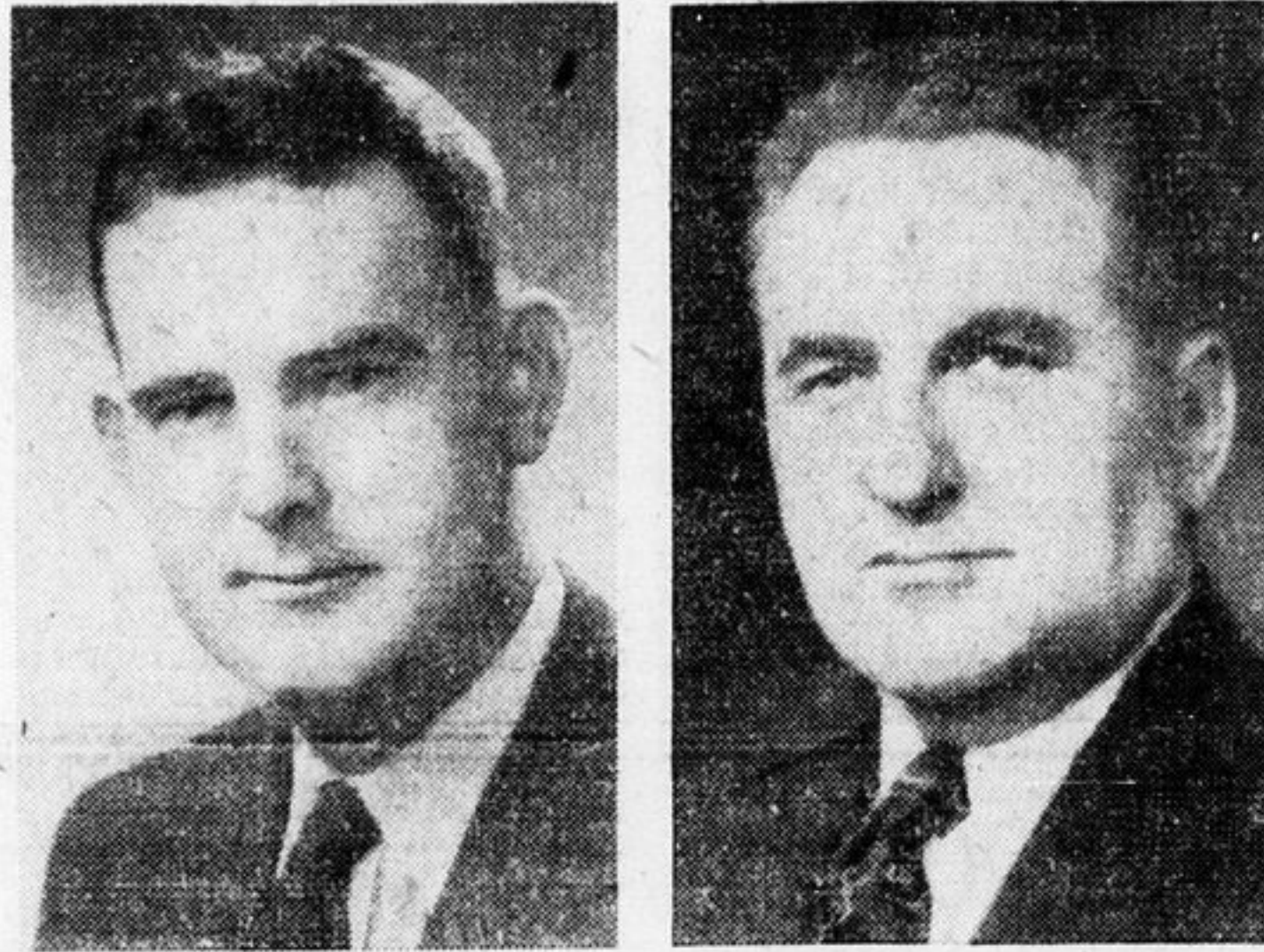
T. H. Badman was up on a charge of non-support of wife and twin children.
