Although U.K. has increased its domestic beet sugar output by 300,000. 000 pounds in the last year, Czarnikow of London points out that Great Britain is not dependent of foreign sur plies. > "A large proportion of the sugar imported into this country from so-called 'Dollar' sources such as Cuba. San Domingo, etc., is not consumed here but is processed by British refiners and re-exported as refined sugar to foreign markets," the London report continues. "This export trade is a valuable source of hard currency income to this country."
