Abraham Haataja Buried in Timmins

Funeral services for Abraham Haataja, of 63 Maple St. N., Timmins, who passed away Monday, Mar. 21st, in the Queen Alexandra Sanitarium at London, Ont., were conducted Friday, Mar. 25th, at 4 p.m. in the Chapel of Walker's Funeral Home, Timmins.

The Reverend A. I. Heinenon, officiated, conducting the services in Finnish and English. Old friends from Toronto and from Cobalt silver mines and from gold-mining camps of Northern Ontario, had gathered to pay their last tribute to one of their few living pioneer farmers.

In his short funeral sermons on: "We seek the city in which is to come", (Heb. 13:14). Rev. Heinenon made references to the deplorable conditions prevailing among the Finnish-Canadians in Toronto during 1909 and in the Cobalt silver mining district during 1910 and a few following years, and in Porcupine, South Porcupine and Timins during 1913 and a few years later, as experienced by the late Mr. Haataja. Also how Mr. Haataja and some of his friends had dreamed and made plans for a brighter future for their children and for future generations.

The late Mr. Abraham Haataja was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Mikko Haataja. He was born at Pyhannan pitaja, Oulu province, Finland, July 9th, 1890. He came to Canada and lived in Toronto during 1909. The next year he moved to Cobalt, where he was employed in silver mines. On Sept. 26, 1915, he married Miss Lempi Seppala in Cobalt. They have one daughter, Irma Lempi. They moved to live permanently in Timmins during 1918. Here he was employed by Conlaorium Mines during a period of some 20 years.
