NOTICE

BY-LAW NUMBER 2

A By-law of the Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate School for School Section No. 1 in the Township of Mountjoy to raise by way of loan the sum of \$15,000.00 for the purposes hereinafter mentioned.

WHEREAS the Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate School for School Section No. 1 in the Township of Mountjoy require to borrow the sum of \$15,000.00 for school purposes, namely, to build, equip and enlarge present school to six rooms and for such purpose to issue debentures therefor bearing interest at the rate of Four and one half (4 1/2%) per centum per annum which is the amount of the debt intended to be created by this by-law;

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to make the principal of the said debt repayable in twenty (20) annual instalments of the respective amounts shown in the second column of Schedule "A" hereto which is hereby declared to be and form a part of this by-law;

AND WHEREAS it will be necessary to raise during the respective years of the said period of twenty years the respective sums set forth in the fourth column of Schedule "A" hereto to pay the yearly sum of principal and interest as they become due;

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property rateable for Separate School purposes in the said School Section No. 1 in the Township of Mountjoy according to the last revised assessment roll is \$164,527.00.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the existing debenture debt of the Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools for School Section No. 1 in the Township of Mountjoy is \$77,300.00 and no part of principal or interest is in arrears.

NOW THEREFORE the Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate School for School Section No. 1 in the Township of Mountjoy ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. That for the purposes aforesaid there shall be borrowed the sum of \$15,000.00 and debentures of the Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate School for Section No. 1 in the Township of Mountjoy shall be issued therefor in sums of not less than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars each. The said debentures shall have coupons attached thereto for the payment of interest annually.

2. The debentures shall be dated as of the first day of May 1949 and shall be payable in twenty (20) annual instalments on the first day of May in each of the years 1950 to 1969 inclusive, and the respective amounts of principal payable in each of such years shall be as shown in Schedule "A" hereto annexed.

3. The debentures as to both principal and interest shall be expressed in Canadian currency, and shall be payable at the Bank of Nova Scotia, Timmins, Ontario.

4. The Chairman and Secretary-Treasurer of the said Board shall sign and issue the said debentures, and the debentures shall be sealed with the corporate seal of the said Board. The interest coupons attached to the debentures shall be signed by the said Secretary-Treasurer and his signature thereon may be written, stamped, lithographed or engraved.

5. During the twenty years, the currency of the debentures, the respective sums set forth in the fourth column of Schedule "A" hereto shall be levied and collected annually by a

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that it is the intention of the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Timmins to pass the following by-law after due notice thereof has been published in accordance with the Provisions of the Municipal Act.

TOWN OF TIMMINS BY-LAW NO.

BEING A BY-LAW to stop up certain portions of the un-named street on the West boundary of Plan M-29 Cochrane, certain portions of Hamelin Street as shown on Plan M-29 Cochrane and a lane between Lots 19 and 20 as shown on Plan M-88 Cochrane.

WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation deems it desirable to close and stop up certain portions of the un-named street on the West boundary of Plan M-29 Cochrane, certain portions of Hamelin Street as shown on Plan M-29 Cochrane and the lane between lots 19 and 20 according to Plan M-88 Cochrane.

AND WHEREAS the Council desires to have the right to lease or sell the portions of the streets and the lane so stopped up.

AND WHEREAS notice of the intention of the Council has been duly advertised as required by the Municipal Act and all persons who claim that their land would be prejudicially affected by this by-law and who applied to be heard have been heard by the Council.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED AS A BY-LAW OF THE TOWN OF TIMMINS as follows:

1. There is hereby closed and stopped up that part of an un-named street on the west boundary of Plan M-29 Cochrane described as follows:

"Commencing at the south west angle of Lot 17 as shown on Registered Plan M-29 Cochrane: Thence North Ast. along the east boundary of the said street shown on said plan a distance of 750 feet to a point on the easterly extension of the south boundary of Westmount Boulevard as shown on registered Plan M-83 Cochrane: Thence South 89 degrees 56 minutes West on said easterly extension 33 feet to a point on the West boundary of lands laid out under Registered Plan M-29 Cochrane: Thence South Ast. along said West boundary 750 feet to a point on the Westerly extension of the South boundary of Lot 17 as shown on said plan; Thence North 39 degrees 56 minutes East along said Westerly extension 33 feet to the point of commencement."

2. There is hereby closed and stopped up that portion of an un-named street shown on the West boundary of Plan M-29 Cochrane described as follows: "Commencing at a point on the east boundary of the 33 foot street shown along the west boundary of Registered Plan M-29 Cochrane, the said point being North Ast. 825 feet from the south west angle of Lot 17 as shown on said plan; Thence North Ast. along the east boundary of said street a distance of 730.92 feet to a point at the north west angle of Lot 13 as shown on said plan; Thence North 89 degrees 57 minutes West along the westerly extension of the north boundary of said Lot 33 feet to a point on the west boundary of said plan; Thence South Ast. along said west boundary 731 feet to a point South 89 degrees 56 minutes West from the point of commencement; Thence North 89 degrees 56 minutes

special rate sufficient therefor over and above all other rates in the same manner and for the like persons and property, by, from, upon or out of which other Separate School rates are levied, raised and collected for the said period of twenty years.

6. The said sum of \$15,000.00 borrowed and interest thereon and the said debentures shall be and the same are hereby made a charge upon the school-house property and premises and on the real and personal property vested in the said Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate School for School Section No. 1 in the Township of Mountjoy and upon all the Separate School rates of the said Board to be hereinafter imposed until the said debentures and each and every of them together with all interest thereon shall have been fully paid and satisfied.

7. The said debentures may contain any clause providing for registration thereof authorized by any Statute relating to Municipal debentures in force at the time of the issue thereof. Read a first and second time this 21 day of April A.D. 1949.

McLEANS GARAGE DESTROYED

A fire broke out at Matheson Thursday, May 5th in McLean's Garage, purchased over a year ago by the Bustard brothers which was completely destroyed, and for a few hours threatened the whole business section of the town.

The fire started at 10:30 a.m. in the back of the garage where they were working.

It is believed that a spark from the welding ignited a container of cleaning fluid and spread so rapidly that fire fighters found it impossible to save the garage. It seemed only a matter of a few minutes from the time the fire started until the roof collapsed. The cars in the building were removed and all but one truck were saved, but the stock and that included a new shipment of tires, were burned together with most of the tools and equipment.

The Economy Store next to the Garage was saved but the side of the wall was blistered and windows broken from the intense heat, even though water was continually sprayed on both roof and wall. The Belmont Hotel and the L. C. Johnson General Store were also in danger and two lines of hose kept on the roofs of both places to keep the buildings wet. In the places where it seemed almost im-

possible to save people were busy packing ready to move and save as much as possible while both Mr. Norman Child and son Harold, owners of the Economy Store had a number of their possessions outside, furniture as well.

The loss to the Bustard brothers was partially covered by insurance. It was only a few years ago that Mr. and Mrs. Bustard lost their home by fire, while they were in Toronto. At that time the sons were home and in the barn milking when the fire broke out and their home was a complete loss.
