Timmins Club Observe All-Kiwanis Week

Timmins Kiwanis Club observed All-Kiwanis Week at the weekly luncheon at the Empire hotel on Monday, by the Kiwanis Education committee of the club. This programme included a brief but comprehensive review of the growth of Kiwanis as outlined by Past Lieutenant-Governor P. T. Moiseley, and the reading of the address of Kiwanis International president by Past Lieutenant-Governor W. O. Langdon.

In introducing this part of the programme, President F. A. Woodbury mentioned the fact that All-Kiwanis Week was observed in honour of the convention of Kiwanis International at Atlantic City. The representatives from the Timmins Club at the convention are Dr. G. H. Gardner and Nick Basciano.

Past Lieutenant-Governor P. T. Moiseley's address featured the notable growth of Kiwanis in the past few years with particular reference to the increase in membership and service of Kiwanis in this northern division and in the Ontario-Quebec-Maritimes district, as well as throughout the continent.

The address of the president of Kiwanis International as delivered at the convention this week was read by Past Lieutenant-Governor W. O. Langdon. The address pointed out that this was the twenty-fifth anniversary of the inauguration of All-Kiwanis Week, and in the quarter century there had been a remarkable growth in the size and value of Kiwanis. Twenty-five years ago there were only 18,000 Kiwanians; now there are 3,000 clubs with a total membership of 200,000. Reference was made to the large amount of money gathered and spent by Kiwanis for community benefit.

Standing, facing the flags, and the charter, the members repeated after Lieutenant-Governor Moiseley the full Kiwanis pledge.

The community singing for the day was confined to Kiwanis songs, led by Ted Bartlett, with Secretary W. H. Wilson at the piano.

Reporting on the last meeting of the board of directors, President F. A. Woodbury said that while the finances at the moment were all right, there was no need for complacency, as the budget called for still more money. Several plans had been suggested by the ways and means committee, including the holding of an agricultural and industrial fair. This would be a big undertaking and if it were taken up all Kiwanians would have to assist, not just a few. Such an event could be held in the McIntyre arena, and might be planned in co-operation with the Horticultural Society.

No definite decision was arrived at, though there was general discussion. (Continued on Page Seven)

Three Tenders For Walk Construction

The tenders for the construction of sidewalks for the Town of Timmins were opened and read to the council at last night's meeting. The bids will be considered by the council after the Ontario Municipal Board has approved the construction of the walks.

Three bids in all were received by the clerk. The Mascioli Construction Company Ltd. made the lowest bid at \$48,851.16 for the complete job. This was followed by W. E. Bezonson with \$60,329.98 and the Klimeck Construction Ltd. with \$68,265.86.

Hallnor Miners Accept Local-100 As Agency

The Porcupine Mine Workers' Union, Local 100, C.C.L., announced Tuesday that the employees of the Hallnor Mines voted overwhelmingly in favor of Local 100 as their bargaining agent. There were 164 eligible to vote, 150 of those eligible voted, 119 voted for Local 100, C.C.L., 29 voted for Mine, Mill, 1 spoiled ballot, a segregated ballot, 14 did not vote. Over 80% of those voting, voted for Local 100. Of the eligible eligible voted, over 73% voted for Local 100. Over 90% of those eligible to vote cast their ballot.

Pat Burke and R. J. Carlin, organizers in charge of the South Porcupine area, organized the mine. Pat Burke says that the boys at the plant have shown by a clear cut decision that they want a clean democratic union. Local 100 is looking forward to being certified in the near future and plans are being made, anticipating the opening of negotiations with the Company.

A vote at the Paymaster Consolidated Mines Ltd. has carried out for the past three days and will be completed today. It is to decide what union will have the power as the bargaining agency for the men of the mine. On Tuesday arrangements were being carried on to have a vote at the McIntyre and Buffalo Ankerite Mines. As yet no definite date has been set for the vote.

Mr. R. Hardy was granted permission by the council, on recommendation from the Health Department of the Town for the construction of a chicken coop on his property. It was stipulated however that no more than 25 chickens are to be kept on the land.

Phalanx Sponsors Political Rally

The political rally, sponsored by the Gamma Phalanx Club of the Porcupine Community Y. M. C. A., was held last Sunday evening in the Court Room, Municipal Building, Timmins. Three speakers were present to represent their parties. These were Arnold Peters, C.C.F.; Charles Yates, K. C., Progressive Conservative; and Ray Stevenson, candidate for this riding. Each speaker took twenty minutes to describe the policies and platform of his party after which Roy Howlett, the chairman, opened the meeting to question and discussion from the floor. W. Syrja was time, and the speakers were thanked on behalf of the assembly by Ray Hunt.

Reported Asbestos Find Few Miles From Matheson

Considerable talk and rumour has been centered around the recent statement of the asbestos find near Matheson, in Munro Township. The reports even from reliable sources seem to be somewhat conflicting.

In Montreal Lewis H. Brown chairman of the board of the John Manville Company announced here last night that \$10,000,000 originally to be spent for the development of the company's Asbestos Quebec property would be used in connection of the new asbestos mine located near Larder Lake in Ontario. The new mine which would yield about twice the ore value as that mined at Asbestos will receive some machinery now used at the Quebec Plant.

Following the above report a release was made from Toronto. Ontario Deputy Minister H. Rickaby said last night that the probable site of the new mine will be Munro Township east of Timmins and approximately 25 miles north of Larder Lake. We have known for many years that there was asbestos in Munro he said. Small showings were discovered a long time ago. To the recent exploration here however there didn't appear to be anything in commercial quality.

To date no further information is available.

H. Brown Initiates Can. March of Dimes

The Rotary Club of Timmins held their regular meeting in the Goldfields Hotel and had as their special guest speaker, Horace Brown, Executive Director of the Canadian Foundation for Poliomyelitis, the Canadian March of Dimes.

The local club has the distinction of being Chapter No. 1 and known as the Porcupine Chapter of the Canadian Foundation for Poliomyelitis.

Guests of the Timmins Rotary Club to hear Horace Brown were, Bruce Leek, Timmins Lions; Brian Shelton, Kiwanis Club; Bob Crosby, Schumacher Lions Club; Dr. Gordon Watt; Len Masson, secy-manager of the Porcupine Chamber of Commerce, Harvey Freeman, CKGB and Don Workman, Kinsmen Club.

Horace Brown, a former resident of Timmins and himself a victim of polio gave a very graphic description of the formation of the March of Dimes in the United States with the former president of the United States Franklin D. Roosevelt as its originator and its recent counterpart the Canadian March of Dimes.

Mr. Brown gave a very stirring account of the work of the foundation which had been recently formed and for the need of funds to keep this new and needy foundation functioning properly. A nation-wide campaign will commence next January to coincide with the one across the border.

At the conclusion of his address Mr. Brown read two letters from victims of polio who were lending their support to the Canadian Appeal for funds for those less fortunate than themselves.

The speaker was introduced by Dr. Wm. Taylor and thanked by Mr. Jim McClelland for his excellent talk.

The members of the Rotary Club were informed by their secretary that 5400 roses would be in on Thursday morning and that the members were urged to be out that evening to help with the packaging and the selling of the roses.
