Friends from all mining camps and farming communities of the Porcupine Golden Area had arrived to pay their last respects to Mrs. Mary Strang, nee Saveanpetto, who passed away peacefully at her home in Night Hawk Centre, June 28th.

The funeral services were conducted in the Chapel of Hunkin's Funeral Home, South Porcupine, July 1st, at two o'clock in the afternoon. Rev. A. I. Heinenon officiated, conducting the services in Finnish and English.

In his short funeral sermon on Death as a blessing, Rev. Heinenon spoke a few words on the great Christian fortitude with which Mrs. Strang had endured her long illness and met finally also death itself, after a useful life of service and sacrifice for the Kingdom of God and for the Christian church in the Porcupine Golden Area.

Mrs. Charles Strang was the daughter of the late Matti Annola and his wife Anna Helena, nee Hautala, of Finland. She was born at Tarvotank, Lappajarven, Vaasa Province, Finland on the eleventh day of March, 1880. She came to Canada together with her late husband and their two children during 1924. For a few months they lived at Copper Cliff, while Mr. Strang was working at Mile 45 and Johnson and Brander Lumber Camps of the Wicks Lumber Co., Ltd. During the next year they bought the farm at Connaught, Night Hawk Centre, where she died. Mr. Strang predeceased her at Haileybury Sanitarium a few years ago.

To mourn her loss she leaves one daughter, Linda (Mrs. Oscar Paananen), son-in-law and two grandchildren, William and Toivo Paananen, at home at Night Hawk Centre; one son, Jalo, at 278 Augusta Ave., Toronto; a brother Matti Mattson, at Grand Marais, Michigan.
