Prime Minister Nehru has accepted an invitation from the Prime Minister of Canada to visit the Dominion when he comes to the U.S.A. in October.

The following messages have been exchanged between the two Prime Ministers. In his message of June 29, the Prime Minister of Canada said:

"On behalf of the Government and people of Canada I extend to you a most cordial invitation to visit this country when you are in North America late of this year. I very much hope you may find it possible to honour us by your acceptance."

"The Canadian people would appreciate an opportunity of welcoming you as Prime Minister of a sister Commonwealth nation and as the distinguished leader of the people of India. For myself, I look forward to renewing the happy personal relations which I so much enjoyed when we met in London last year."

**Message of Acceptance**  
Replying on June 30, the Prime Minister of India said: "I hasten to thank you for the very kind invitation you have extended to me on behalf of the

## Tisdale Council to Decide On Parking Meters Mon.

At the last meeting of council E. A. Horton, former deputy minister of municipal affairs and now representative of Dual Automatic Parking Meter Company, outlined in detail the meter performance in cities and towns across Canada.

Both Mr. Horton and the council agreed that meters were badly needed in Schumacher, but not in South Porcupine. The clerk-treasurer, who investigated the meter situation in other places, found that there was no complaint against them, and that they were now in use in Cochrane, Sudbury and Kirkland Lake.
