To-day's GARDEN-GRAF



Released by Central Press Canadian With tomatoes getting red and ripe, now is the time to guard them against last minute invasion of enemies.

Since insecticides are of questionable value in controlling corn earworm, sanitation is recommended. Collect and destroy infested tomatoes as soon as discovered.

Take steps also to guard tomatoes against attacks of what is known as blossom-end rot. This rot appears as a water-soaked area on the blossom-end of the tomatoes, as illustrated. The affected area later turns brown or black and shrivels.

Blossom-end rot is caused by breakdown of cells due to an uneven supply of water. To prevent this type of rot avoid planting tomatoes in dry locations. During dry spells water the plants regularly.
