Four men in a truck went on a 100-mile circle of violence in central Ontario early last Friday. Before the truck was stopped by a roadblock and a hail of police bullets outside of Peterborough, five persons had been slashed by a knife and Jack Loucks, 37, died in Lindsay of knife wounds.

Loucks was fatally stabbed in a melee on a Lindsay street after he talked to four men in a truck. Three other men were also slashed. Some hours later a couple operating a refreshment stand 10 miles north of Peterborough were attacked when four men didn't get coffee as quickly as they wanted.

About the only reason for the attacks was given by a witness of the Lindsay fight, who said the four in the truck "looked mad."

But four men—Paul Zahodnik, James Zahodnik, John Zahodnik and William Yuzwa—were due to appear in court at Lindsay this week to face charges of murder, wounding, assault and attempted robbery.

Nomination Meet Held At Calvert

The Township of Calvert nomination meeting was held in the Town Hall on Monday, Nov. 28th, at 7 p.m. A very quiet meeting resulted in four ratepayers being nominated for reeve and twelve for council.

Paul Roy, Barney Nosov, Felix Gratton and Charles Pedskalny were nominated for the office of reeve. Felix Gratton, the reeve for 1949 retired, stating that his duties as Treasurer of Local 90 Pulp Sulphite and Papermill Workers did not leave him sufficient time to carry on the duties of reeve.

Paul Roy, a councillor for 1949, and Barney Nosov, who served as a councillor for several terms some years ago, both qualified for the office of reeve. Charles Pedskalny, the other nominee for reeve, and who served as a councillor for 1949, declined the nomination, stating that he wished to qualify as a councillor.

The following ratepayers were nominated as councillors: Sylvio Belanger, Charles Pedskalny, William Flageole, Fred Little, Majella Montfort, Pau Roy, Frank Lenoir, Louis Lauzon, Peter Lezier, Roy Hopkins, George Lux and L. A. Charlebois.

Of those nominated as councillors Sylvio Belanger, Charles Pedskalny, William Flageole and Fred Little have already qualified. Should no more nominees qualify this would mean an acclamation, but undoubtedly others will qualify before the time limit expires.

Of those nominated for council, Mr. Pedskalny and Mr. Flageole served on the 1949 council, while Roy Hopkins and L. A. Charlebois served previously and Paul Roy, a member of the 1949 council is now running for reeve.

Nominations were also held for trustees of the Consolidated Boards of Calvert.

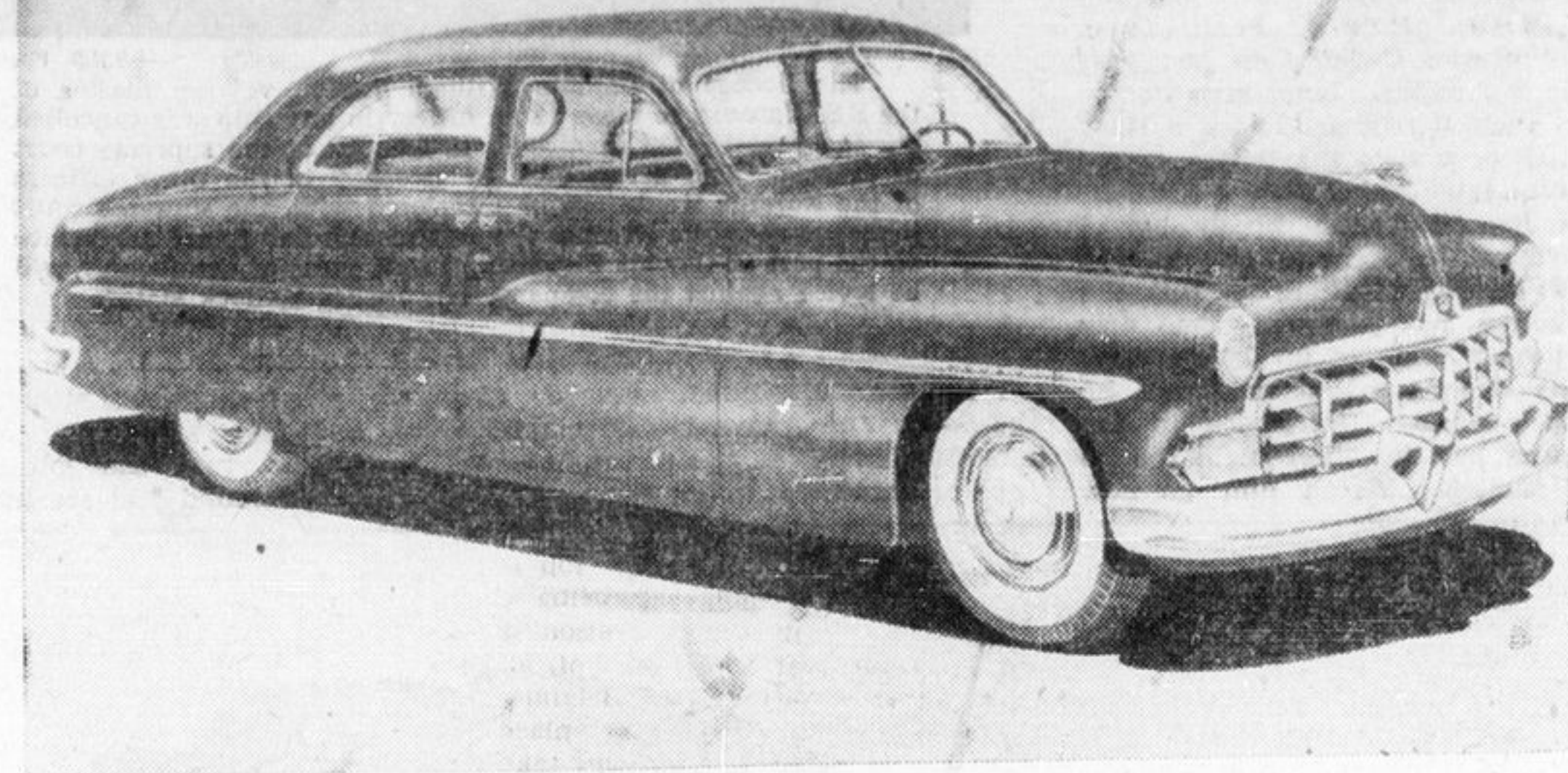
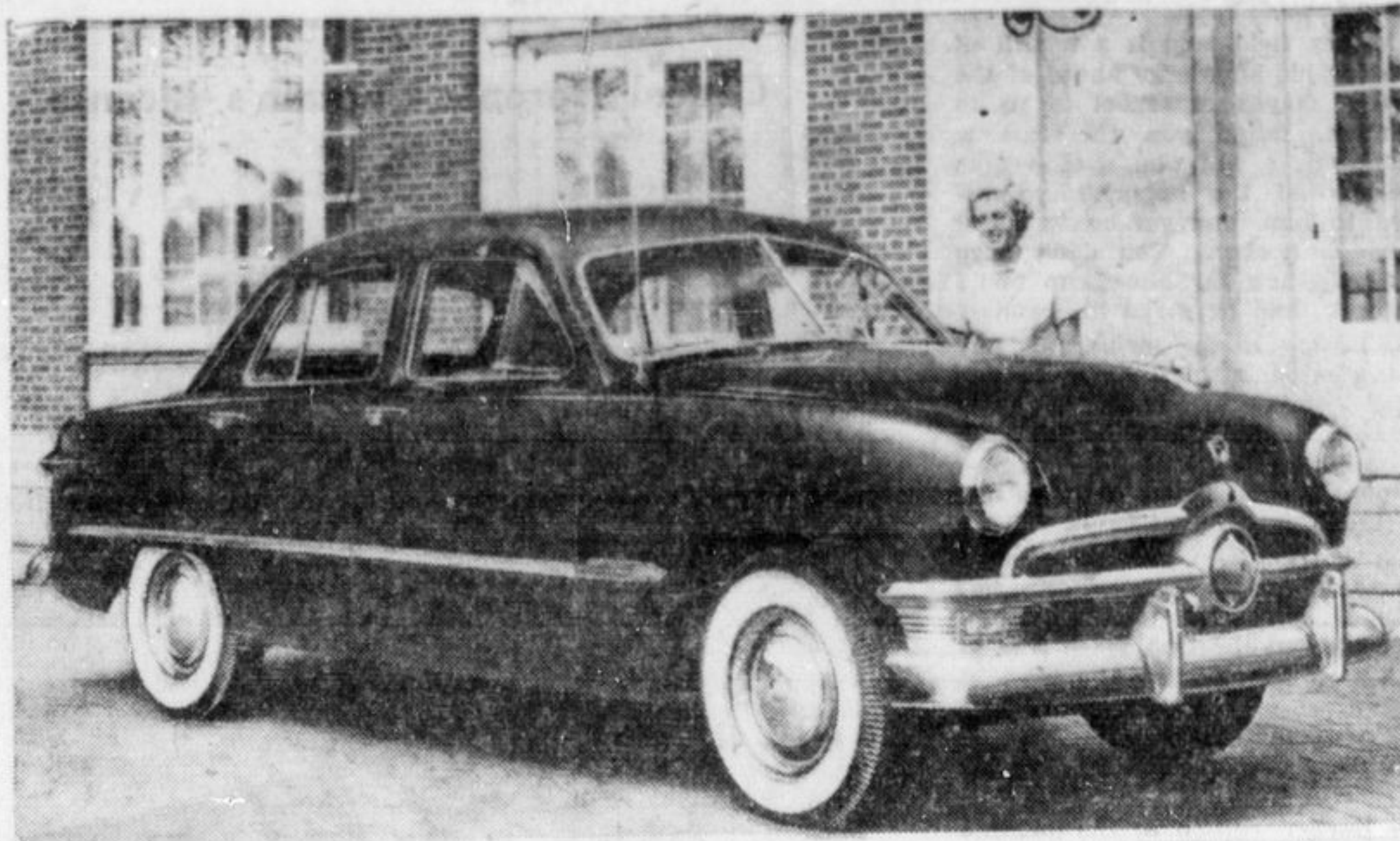

Nomination Meet Held at Matheson

Nomination meeting for the Black River Township was held Friday, Nov. 25th at the Oddfellows Hall, Matheson. Nominations commenced at 1:00 p.m. and closed at 3:30 p.m. A financial statement as of the end of October, 1949, was read and verbally itemized. Perhaps the outstanding item is the fact that the initial loan of \$60,000 borrowed four years ago has been reduced to about \$20,000. During this four-year period, over 175 miles of road has been improved and gravelled, culverts installed, bridges have had to be repaired and in some cases built. The township bought property and during the past year sold it in building lots realizing a profit of about \$900.00. The township offices, purchased the first year are now worth double the purchase price. All in all, the township would seem to be in a sound financial position. If the arrears in taxes were collected the entire amount of the loan could be paid and a substantial surplus in the bank. This speaks very well for the good judgment used by the Reeve Leo Alarie and the Councillors during the organizing years of the Black River Township.
