Mountjoy Church Grows Every Year

The Mountjoy United Church vestry is packed high and tight with magazines and books and pictures, paintings, films.

From a bookcase the minister withdrew a small box containing rolls of film, entitled: "Boy meets girl," "Boy dates girl," "Boy marries girl," "Let the children come," "The birth of Christ."

"These," he said, "are for showing to Sunday school groups, and of course the last one we showed at Christmas time."

A Beautiful Blonde

A minute later a huge flat box seemed to appear from nowhere to the vestry desk. It contained a great many colored kodachrome slides: a little blonde girl, her hair glistening in the morning sun and blowing in the wind as she stood at the tip of a small wharf over the blue waters of a northern lake surrounded by a spruce and cedar trees and a few clouds hovering in the distance; a circle of boys, each with his arms out in crawl position, as indicated by the instructor, was another photograph. Each picture evinced sharp focus, full light and color. They are shown to various groups, the camping ones to boy and girl rallies in the Cochrane area during the winter.

Comforting Appearance

Mountjoy United church is of concrete and brick, high and wide inside, embellished by several paintings between the windows: Walter Sallman's "Christ," an oil reprint of a fishboat scene, Christ suggesting to the rich boy that he "Give what he hath to the poor," and a pencilled picture of the Madonna surrounded by children, by 15-year-old Bella Vichon.

This last makes quite an appeal to children, according to the minister, whose full name, by the way, is Rev. E. Gilmour Smith.

The church is well lit, contains no pillars, feels comfortable. The choir-loft is large enough for the senior choir (18). The junior choir assembles at floor level immediately below.

Two Choirs

Mrs. J. Wilkins, church organist since 1944, organized and developed the junior choir, which now enrolls 22 additional voices for the morning service. The previous organists were: Wallace Young, Mrs. Eric Luk and Mrs. Alfred Gamble.

The church was built in 1941, assisted very much indeed by volunteer labor, and opened in January, 1942. It serves principally the south west section of Timmins. The Sunday school had previously opened in 1940 at the Matagami public school, Mrs. Maynard Raycroft presiding.

50-50 Group

In 1942 the church formed a Couples' Group, or 50-50 group, for young adults, single and married. This group has continued since. Its meetings may feature a speaker, an evening of music, or panel discussions, the latter being particularly popular, attests Mr. Smith.

In 1945 Mrs. Smith established a Mothers Group for mothers with pre-school children. This group, children included, meets once a week on Monday afternoons. It now enrolls 30, is the first of its kind in the north, and is still flourishing.

REGULATIONS

applying to certain uses of

ELECTRICITY IN ONTARIO

The Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario announces that, effective January 16th, 1950, the following regulations made under the Power Commission Act apply to all territorial districts, except as set out in part IV hereof.

- PART I WATER HEATERS**
- (1) Unless water heaters operated by electrical power are—
 - (a) equipped with thermostatic control; and
 - (b) installed in or on tanks which are thermally insulated with a minimum of 1 inch in thickness of glass or rock-wool insulation, or other material having at least the same heat insulating capacity,
 no municipality or municipal commission receiving electrical power from the Commission shall supply or use or permit to be supplied or used by any person the electrical power or any part thereof for the operation of water heaters installed or replaced after the date of publication of these regulations in The Ontario Gazette under The Regulations Act, 1944.
 - (2) No person shall take from any municipality or municipal commission any electrical power received from the Commission and use it in a manner contrary to the provisions of subregulation 1.
 - (3) No person shall take any electrical power procured from the Commission and use it for the operation of water heaters in a manner contrary to the provisions of subregulation 1.
- PART II SPACE HEATERS**
- (1) No municipality or municipal commission receiving electrical power from the Commission shall supply or use or permit to be supplied or used by any person electrical power or any part thereof for the operation of air-heaters, grates, radiators, boilers or any other device for space heating in hotels, tourist cabins, shops, offices, commercial premises and, except in the case of sickness, residences.
 - (a) No person shall take from any municipality or municipal commission any electrical power received from the Commission and use it in a manner contrary to the provisions of subregulation 1.
 - (b) No person shall take any electrical power procured from the Commission and use it in a manner contrary to the provisions of subregulation 1.
 - (c) No person shall take any electrical power procured from the Commission and use it in a manner contrary to the provisions of subregulation 1.
 - (d) Municipally-owned electric substations, where no person is regularly in attendance.
 - (2) Subregulation 1, 2 and 3 shall not apply to space heating in,
 - (a) water-pumping-stations;
 - (b) telephone relay, and repeater-stations;
 - (c) radio-beam stations; and
 - (d) municipally-owned electric substations, where no person is regularly in attendance.
- PART III LIGHTING**
- (1) No municipality or municipal commission receiving electrical power from the Commission shall supply or use or permit to be supplied or used by any person electrical power or any part thereof for,
 - (a) subject to subregulation 2, lighting of interiors of shops, show-windows and offices except,
 - (i) not more than 1 watt per square foot of gross floor-area of a shop during business hours, and after cessation of business with the public not more than 1 watt per square foot of the gross floor area of that part of the shop where the staff is actually working;
 - (ii) not more than 10 watts per lineal foot of width of show-windows of shops between 4:30 p.m. and 9 p.m. and only while the shop is open for business;
 - (iii) not more than 2 watts per square foot of gross floor-area of an office during office hours, and after office hours not more than 2 watts per square foot of gross floor-area of that part of the office where the staff is actually working;
 - (b) for the protection of property after business hours not more than 5 watts per 100 square feet of gross floor-area of a shop or office, or 40 watts per shop or office whichever is the greater;
 - (c) lighting of exterior signs;
 - (d) exterior flood- or outline-lighting for decorative, ornamental or advertising purposes;
 - (e) lighting of out-door Christmas trees;
 - (f) lighting of parking-lots, used-car lots, service stations, out-door industrial premises and out-door playing fields except,
 - (i) not more than 10 watts per 100 square feet of parking-lot space while open for business;
 - (ii) not more than 10 watts per 100 square feet of that portion of used-car lots used for display space while open for business and not more than 5 watts per 100 square feet of the used-car lot after cessation of business;
 - (2) In these regulations,
 - (a) "shop" means any building or a portion of a building, booth, stall or place where goods are handled or exposed or offered for sale, or where goods are manufactured and which is not a factory, but shall not include any part of a building used for office purposes; and
 - (b) "office" shall mean a building or part of a building occupied and used for office purposes only.
- PART IV**
7. Parts II and III shall not apply to the territorial districts of,
- (a) Kenora;
 - (b) Rainy River; and
 - (c) Thunder Bay.
- PART V**
8. In these regulations,
- (a) "shop" means any building or a portion of a building, booth, stall or place where goods are handled or exposed or offered for sale, or where goods are manufactured and which is not a factory, but shall not include any part of a building used for office purposes; and
 - (b) "office" shall mean a building or part of a building occupied and used for office purposes only.

FENALTY PROVIDED BY THE POWER COMMISSION ACT FOR VIOLATION OF REGULATIONS

Any person refusing or neglecting to comply with any direction, order, regulation, restriction, prohibition or control made or exercised by the Commission under this section shall be guilty of an offence and in addition to any other liability, incur a penalty of not less than \$100 and not more than \$500 and a further penalty of not less than \$100 and not more than \$500 for each and every separate day upon which such refusal or neglect is repeated or continued.

The penalties imposed by or under the authority of this section shall be recoverable under The Summary Convictions Act.
