New British-Designed Air Ambulance

A new British air ambulance is being developed by Auster Aircraft Limited of Leicester, England, specially designed for bush doctors in Australia and for medical men whose patients live in isolated areas. It is the Auster Avis, Mk. 2. The plane will carry a standard full-sized stretcher and, apart from the pilot, has accommodation for a sitting casualty and an attendant. Provision is made to enable blood transfusions to be given while the air ambulance is in flight. The ambulance can be converted into an ordinary four seater aircraft when not in use. If needed, the conversion into an air ambulance can be made in a few minutes. It is hoped that this new aircraft will be finalised during this year at the Company's works at Leicester. This picture shows how the side of the Auster Avis Mk. 2 air ambulance can be lowered to load a stretcher case.
