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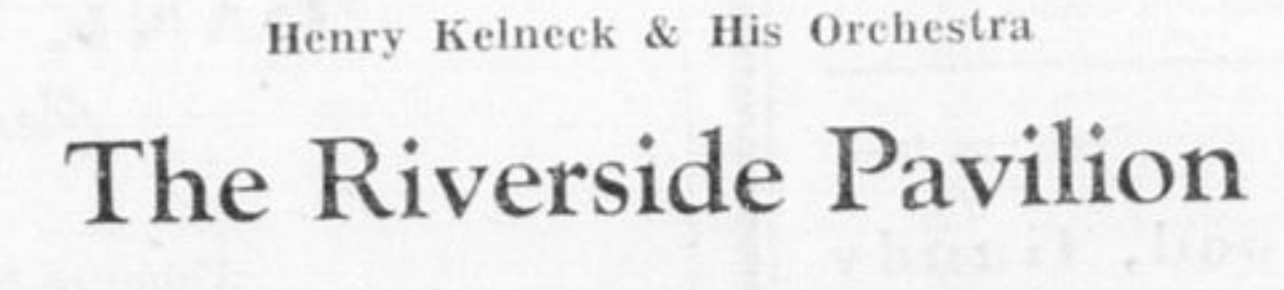

The Forest Fires Prevention Act and Regulations

Statutes of Ontario, 1948, Being Chapter 32; 12, George VI

## REQUIRES

PROSPECTORS - WOODS OPERATORS - FARMERS FISHERMEN - TOURISTS AND ALL OTHERS

Travelling, Using or Working, the Forest Area, Between 1 April and 31 October in each year

To comply with the following regulations:

PROSPECTORS	WOODS OPERATORS	FARMERS & SETTLERS
1. Travel Permit required in closed areas.	1. Work Permit required (all year requirement). "Before any bush operation including sawmills, commences.	1. Burning Permit required for brush slash, and/or clearing fires. Fires to be guarded until completely O.U.T.
2. Burning Permit required (for other than camp fires).	2. Maintain Fire Equipment in accordance with schedule.	
3. Work Permit required (for assessment work on mining claims).	3. Burning Permits required.	
MINING CLAIM OWNERS	FISHERMEN, TOURISTS AND OTHERS	
1. Work Permit required, (showing definite location of camp).	1. Travel Permit required in closed areas.	
2. Travel Permit required in closed areas.	2. Burning Permit required for other than camp fires.
