News From SOUTH PORCUPINE

Eino Kautto Killed

Eino Kautto, aged 28, whose parents Mr. and Mrs. Matti Kautto live in S. Porcupine was killed in an auto accident on Thursday May 18th when the car he was driving overturned in a ditch near Ville Marie, Quebec. Two young men who were with him in the car, Willis Maki of Porcupine and Robert McMillan of Windsor, Ont., were hurt slightly and were in hospital.

Suffers Shock

Maki suffering from shock had his arm broken in two places but was sufficiently recovered to attend the funeral on Sunday.

Eino, who was born in South Porcupine was an exceptionally clever student at both public and high schools here, and on graduation from the latter, entered the Engineering Course at Queen's University, Kingston. While he left college to join the R.C.A.F. and became a flying officer, serving overseas for 4 years.

After discharge he worked as a salesman for Diversey Chemical Co., of Chicago.

He was on a regular road trip when this accident happened.

Sympathy Expressed

Sympathy has been expressed on every hand for the family, and young wife of the deceased, and was shown in great measure at the funeral which Church, South Porcupine.

It was one of the most largely attended funerals ever held here. Fifty members of the local branch of the Canadian Legion wearing berets attended, and the Harmony Choir of Timmins sang the Finnish Funeral Lament with Mrs. Laura Kuisma taking the solo parts. She was accompanied by her father Mr. Wuorimaki on the violin.

The English part of the service was taken by Rev. R. J. Scott and the Finnish service conducted by Rev. Howard Eaton of North Bay. Rev. David Mitchell, Chaplain for the Canadian Legion local branch, held the military service at the graveside.

Finnish Custom

As is usual at Finnish funerals the cards, telegrams, and expressions of sympathy were read at the service. Mrs. Kuisma read these. Pallbearers were John Fell, Neilo Welinius, Eugene Merikallio, Onni Savijarvi, Izak Mieta and Franklin Maki.

Mrs. Woodall Passes

The death of Mrs. Annie Woodall, widow of the late Archdeacon Woodall, of Timmins, occurred on Monday at noon in Porcupine General Hospital.

She was known to be in indifferent health since the death of the Archdeacon on Christmas Day 1949, but her death came with sudden shock to her family and friends.

A heart attack two weeks ago caused her removal from 386 James Ave, Timmins to the Porcupine General Hospital, and a second attack on Monday caused her death.

She was born in Luton, Bedfordshire, England on Sept. 12th 1871. (nee Cain) and came as a young woman to Canada in 1903, to marry the young English clergyman who had preceded her some months earlier to be a missionary to the Indians at Ruperts House on James Bay. She made the trip to Ruperts House from Chapeau down the Missinabie river in a 40 ft. canoe with six Indians paddling and three other passengers. The trip took three weeks with several long portages. At Moose Factory she was met by Bishop Newham who took her across the bay to Ruperts House where she married James Ernest Woodall.

The pluck and endurance of a young English girl who adjusted her life completely, to do her duty as a wife under such conditions forty-six years ago, is to be marvelled at. She not only had her children unattended by doctor or nurse, (only by natives) but assisted her missionary husband in teaching his flock; and by uncomplaining acceptance of such conditions made a home for husband North.

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In 1914 they came down from Ruperts House to live at Porquis Junction and in 1916 the town was burnt out and they lost everything.

This happened when the Archdeacon was absent on diocesan work.

Later, 16 years ago, the family moved to S. Porcupine, when the Archdeacon retired, she accompanied him to Vancouver and later to Toronto and back to Timmins where they resided for the past two years.

Mrs. Woodall was active in Diocesan work for the Anglican Church and was a devoted mother to her five children: Mary, Mrs. Arnett of Etglehart; Grace, Mrs. Hennessey of Trout Mills N. Bay; Rupert, with the Department of Lands and Forests Northern Ontario; Marjorie, of Timmins and Kathleen who is Kindergarten teacher at Golden Ave. School S. Porcupine.

The funeral takes place on Wednesday from St. Paul's Church, S. Porcupine and will be buried beside her husband in Tisdale Cemetery. To the bereaved family S. Porcupine offers its sincerest sympathy in their great loss.

Word From China

Miss Grace Williston Dominion Youth leader of the Anglican Church was the guest of Rev. and David Mitchell of Toronto over the weekend.

On Sunday morning in St. Paul's church she spoke of her missionary work in Honan, China. She was born in China, daughter of a missionary but was brought up in Canada.

She went back to teach in Honan in 1944 but was evacuated in 1946. "The people of China," she said, "are not so much interested in politics or Government factions as they are in maintaining their way of life. The need for missionaries is great and in spite of disasters the Christian faith still persists."
