FIELD DAY

On Monday, August 4th, McIntyre Park will be the scene of their yearly Field Day and Picnic.

For thirteen years now the McIntyre mine have set aside one day of the year, where all their employees and their families gather at the spacious Mac Park, and thoroughly enjoy themselves at the expense of the McIntyre Mine.

Thousands of miners, on this one day, compete in such events as log sawing, relay races, tug-of-war, sprint races and many other interesting contests for employees only.

For the children, the park is equipped with a merry-go-round, clowns, movies, fish ponds and a refreshment booth, where the children of the McIntyre employees can obtain hot dogs, hamburgers and pop free of charge by simply presenting tickets or tokens, which are given out at the mine to all employees.

The employees of the McIntyre mine have an annual safety draw. That means that the men who work either on surface or underground for a period of one year without an accident during that time are awarded a bonus, in the form of War Savings Bonds.

The McIntyre Mine will display and operate their mechanical and safety equipment used throughout the year in the different departments of the big mine, for the employees safety and benefits.

The events start early in the morning with the youngsters running races, foot races, jumping, etc., and gradually working up to the men's 100, 220 and one mile races.

At 1:00 p.m. the Schumacher Junior Baseball Team will play a regular scheduled game with Jim Parker's entry, followed by a senior tilt between Hollinger and McIntyre teams at 4:00 p.m.

On the program for 6:00 p.m. the McIntyre Soccer team will play host to the Dome Pories in an exhibition match. Many soccer followers who have missed their favourite sport in the last two or three years, will have an opportunity to witness what shapes up as a fair match between these two rival soccer teams.

For the evening the scene switches to the McIntyre Arena, where at 8:45, thousands of people will have an opportunity to see the world's figure skating champion, and Canada's sweetheart, Barbara Ann Scott, of Ottawa, don the blades and show why she was declared the best figure skater in the world, in an ice display, along with other skaters of the Porcupine Camp and guests from all over Canada and the U.S.A.

To top off the evening, if you are still on your feet and rarin' to go, there will be a monster dance held in the auditorium and gymnasium of the spacious McIntyre Arena, where you can either square dance to the music of Ron Jones and his Hill Billies, or trip the light fantastic to the rhythms of Eddie Morandin and his orchestra.

Don't forget, you now McIntyre employees, to check Monday, August 4th on your calendar and plan to attend one full day of fun, recreation, sport and competition at the McIntyre Ball Park and McIntyre Arena.

In addition to winning the tournament Karl made a clean sweep of the affair, by capturing the putting and approaching matches held as a side attraction.

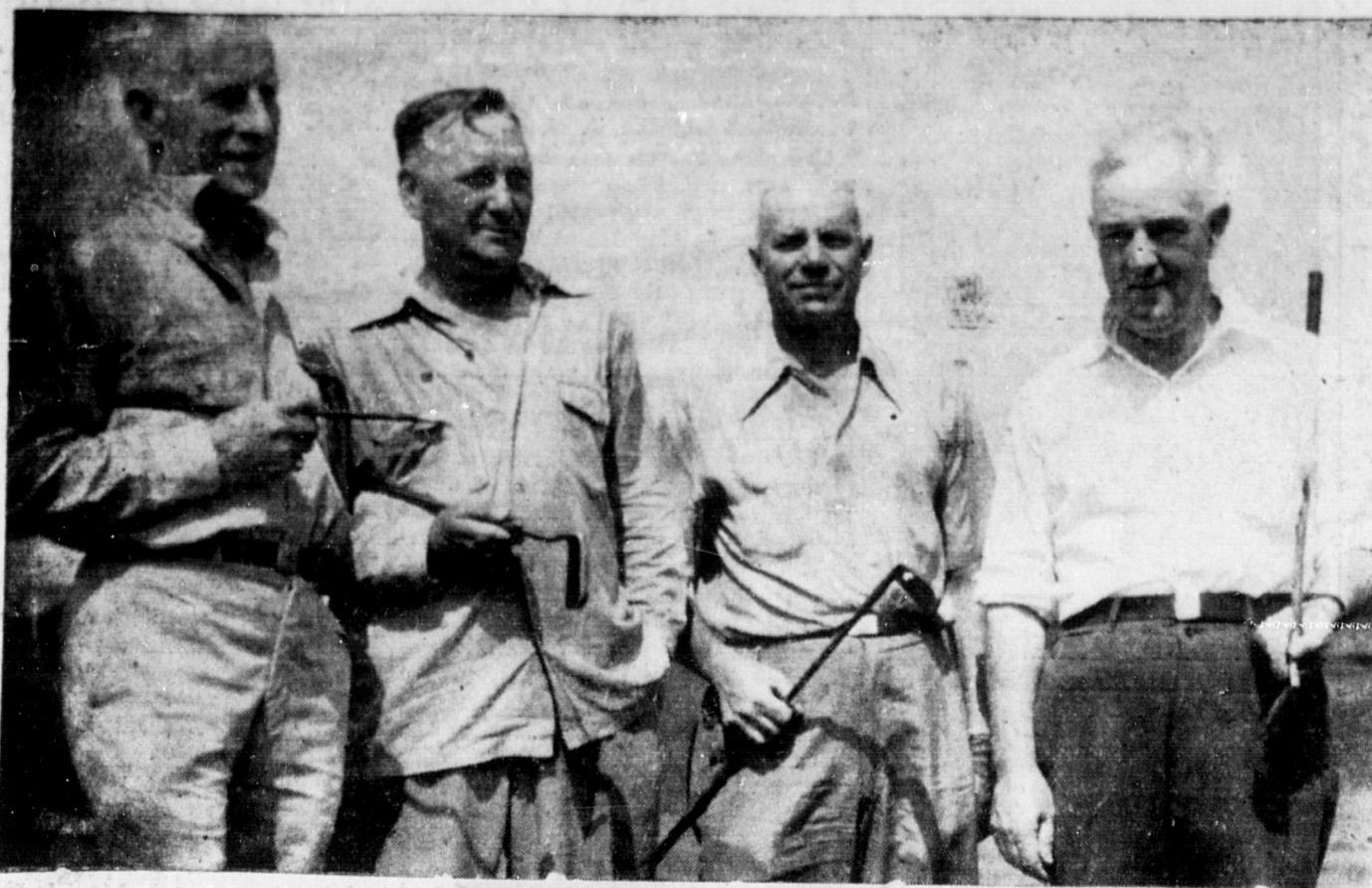
Karl carded a 40-42 for an 82 for the day, and a gross 165 for the tournament. He played a sound, steady game and was never in trouble at any time.

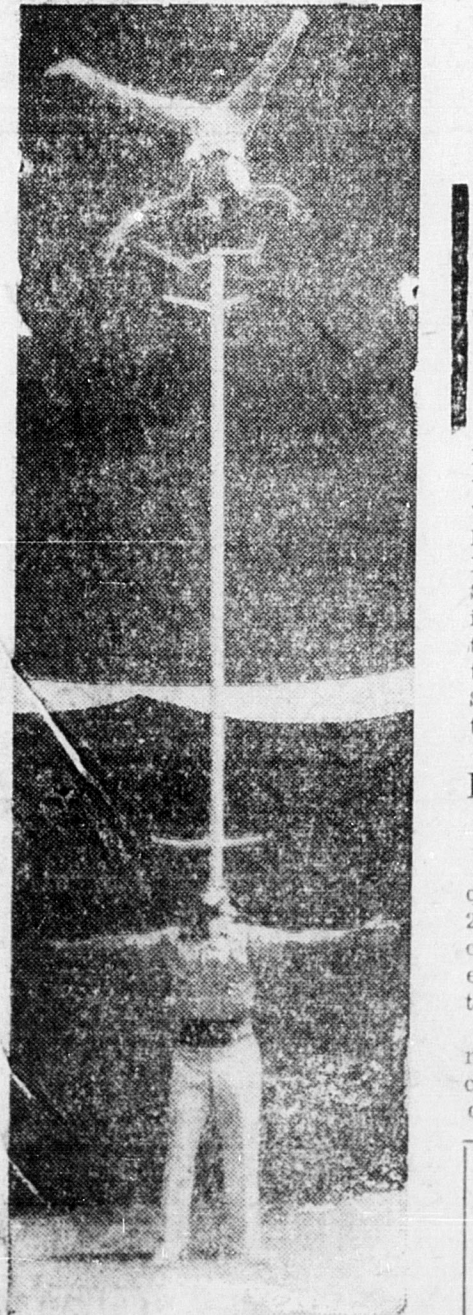
Swimming & Water Safety Course Completed

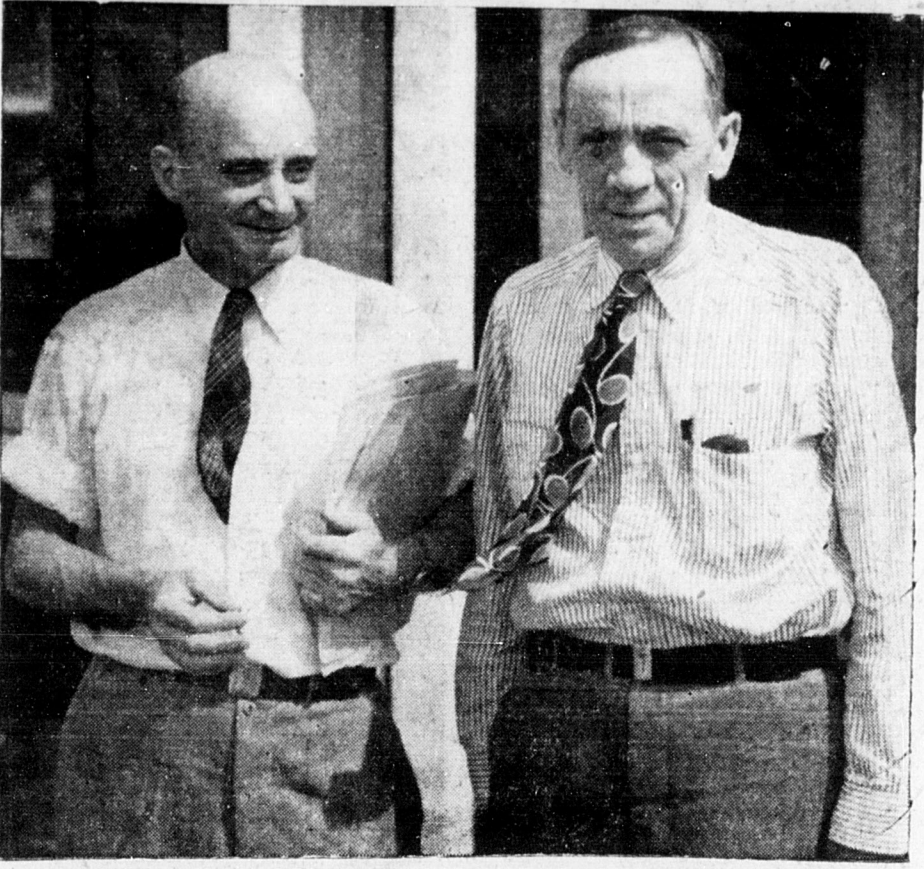
Pins, Crests, and certificates will be given to those who were successful. These emblems signify the standing of the holder and bear a Red Cross.
