Deltiology Anyone?

The golden age of the picture postcard in Canada was the period between 1900 and 1916. These postcards represent a portrait of Edwardian Canada and its people.

Penny postcards kept people in touch with one another just as social media does today. Photographers, both professional and skilled amateurs, recorded almost every facet of life, rural or urban. Most of the cards in our Oakville-Bronte collection show street scenes, parades, and homes.

When I was a teenager in the 1950s, I did chores for two elderly women who lived around the corner from our place. When they died, I purchased (for one dollar), all of the books from their estate. In one of the books, which dates from the late 1800s, was an Oakville postcard being used as a bookmark. I kept it and soon the hunt was on!

We have approximately 210 vintage cards in our Oakville collection and 70 in our Bronte collection. Most date from 1900 to 1940. Modern cards (1975-2000) for both communities number 110.

When we attended two or three postcard shows a year, deltiology collectors were out in full force!

Ninth Line Public School Blue Prints, 1934




George Lyon has donated architectural drawings for the Trafalgar Township Ninth Line public school, S.S. No. 12, today called Maple Grove. The architectural firm was Molesworth West & Secord of Toronto. The drawings are dated 1934. The sketches show the exterior

facades of the school, with a "future addition" included as well as the interior floor plans. Also in the set of drawings are those for the septic tank catch basins and outlets.

George received the drawings from Harvey Lyon, son of T.R. Lyon who had been the Ninth Line school custodian. Sometimes the Maple Grove teachers boarded with the Lyon family.

The exterior drawings have to be copied by Staples for our digital collection as the





sketches themselves are light beige on a very dark blue background which does not photograph well. While we wait to be able to do this, included here is a photograph of the basement level interior drawing and one of the first floor interior, for your information.

Between 1950 and 1970, Ontario school boards centralized the public schools in their jurisdiction. The old one or two room "S.S" (School Section) schools were closed as sleek, multi-roomed modern schools were built. Maple Grove contains both the former S.S. No. 12 building on the left as well as the "modern" addition stretching out to the right in this photograph taken in the 1960's. http://images.ourontario.ca/TrafalgarTownship/3633142/data?dis=dm

Her letter simply said, "Greetings, Thought you could add this photo to your collection." The studio portrait was taken by Brock & Co - Trenton, Brighton, Colborne, Marmora.
