For the past week, Lake Superior has been in a very quiet mood and work done by the Canada Dredge Derrick has increased considerably. The first concrete pipe is being set into place. Considerable care must be exercised in placing this pipe as the first pipe must be placed at the correct distance from shore, at the correct depth below water level and the proper grade.
