BOILER HOUSE WHISTLE NOW IN USE

Another milestone in Terrace Bay development was reached at noon on Thursday, January 8th, when

the boiler house steam whistle was blown for the first time. The whistle will be used to indicate starting and quitting times and also for fire alarm purposes.

Starting and Quitting Times - The whistle will be blown for a six second interval at the following times: 7:25 a.m. ..... 7:30 a.m. ..... 12:00 noon ..... 12:55 p.m. ..... 1:00 p.m. ..... 5:30 p.m. ....

For fire alarm purposes the whistle will be blown for 20 Fire Alarm Signals seconds in a series of short blasts as a fire warning, followed by the following code to indicate the location of the fire:

FIRE IN TOWNSITE - 1 blast of 10 seconds duration FIRE IN SOUTH CAMP AREA - 2 blasts of 10 seconds duration each. FIRE IN MILLSITE AREA - 3 " 10 " 10 each.

All fire signals will be repeated in their entirity 3 times, at 30 second intervals, including the 20 second series of short blasts.
