and supervisors were addressed by E. V. "Al" Johnson, Kimberly-Clark's Safety Supervisor at a meeting held Thursday afternoon July 22nd in the Staff Camp.

In his opening remarks, the speaker immediately focused attention on the evils of lost time accidents by noting that when such accidents occur, people lose wages, they suffer, and the inefficient use of manpower resulting is not good living and is not good business.

Al stressed the importance of having Quality, Safety and Quantity go hand in hand and noted that proper job instruction by foremen and supervisors put across the idea of doing the job the right way, which is always the safe way. He also stated that Kimberly-Clark management's attitude toward an overall accident prevention program was based on recognition of individual responsibility as a key factor in the success of such a program.

The speaker also outlined the advantages of safety programs being carried into the homes and throughout the community, since 83% of all accidental deaths today originate in other than industrial activities.

In introducing the speaker D. C. Porter, Mill Manager stated that "safety falls on the shoulders of all".
