

COAL FOR TOWNSITE HOUSES

Orders may be placed any time by Townsite residents for their supply of coal for the coming winter. Anthracite coal will be sold at a price of \$22.00 per ton delivered. However, if residents of the Townsite agree to take a full truckload of coal before December 1st, the price will be \$21.50 per ton. This reduction of 50¢ per ton on coal taken before December 1st is granted due to the saving in rehandling the coal from the railroad car to the stock pile and from the stock pile to the delivery truck. It will also be much easier to deliver coal to houses before the snow flies. Orders for fuel should be placed with Joe Heenan in the Administration Office.
