SIMPLE

Just because simple hand tools don't make a lot of noise and throw a lot of mechanical and electrical power around like the big machines do, that's no sign they can't cause accidents - some serious ones, too.

But it's also true that such accidents can be prevented by a few simple rules - like these:

1. Never use a hard-faced hammer on a highly tempered tool, such as a drill, file, die, jig, etc. Chips may fly...
2. Use only wrenches that are the right size for the particular job...
3. Keep chisels, knives, axes and all such cutting tools sharp...
4. Don't use a tool with a broken or splintered handle or a loose part...
5. Don't use a file without a handle...
6. Wear goggles when using tools that may produce flying pieces.
