As was promised in last Wook's edition of the "Nows", we are now going CREDIT UNION NEWS to set out the conditions of membership in the Torrace Bay Crodit

Union.

Membership in this Credit Union is open to all employees of the LongLac Pulp and Paper Co. at Terrace Bay and to all residents of Terrace Bay, plus the people residing within a five mile radius. These latter conditions mean that, if you are employed by other Firms here and you live in this Community you are eligible to join. If you are employed by the LongLac Co. and you reside elsewhere you are also eligible to join. If you live within five miles of this Town, no matter your place of employment, you may become a member.

Membership fees are set at twenty-five cents (.25) per person. This fee is used to help defray the normal operating costs such as stationary, passbooks, ledgers, etc. You must secure an application form from any member of the Executive Board and this application is then passed on at the next monthly meeting of the Board. The Board will consider other aspects of your application besides the ones mentioned above. The prime factors considered will be your reliability, character, etc., because as this is a mutual organization the Credit Committee will probably be lending out the other members' money.

Once your application has been approved, a passbook will be issued which will show all your deposits, share holdings, loans, interests and dividends in your account.

Shares have been set at Five dollars apiece and all dividends, premiums, etc., will be paid according to the number of shares held by a member. Every member is required to purchase at least one share within three months of membership.
