## THE CODE OF THE SEA

Our democracy has brought to its highest fruition the philosophy of personal freedom for the individual. But it has been a long, hard fight, and as recently as the last century, in many fields the individual was considered no better than livestock or at best a bonded slave.

This type of indenture was most prevalent on the merchant ships of the day, which were operated under a code so rigorous and so cruel that it was a strong man indeed who could successfully cope with it. Members of merchant crews had no rights; they were subject to the whims of the ship's master who was primarily interested in making a profitable run for his owners. Living conditions were bad, food was rotten and worm-ridden. The individual who protested was immediately slapped into chains as a mutineer - and this in spite of the Constitution, which seemed to be secondary to the code of the sea!

It took a book by a young New Englander, Richard H. Dana, to start the reforms which led to improved conditions on ships. Dana's book, "TWO YEARS BEFORE THE MAST" has become an American, even an international classic. In a simple and powerful style it brought the astounding facts before the public.

An aroused public opinion forced legislature to improve conditions on ships. And "The Seaman's Act", which has come to be regarded as the Magna Charta of the blue water sailor, was born.
