CURLING NEWS Plans are underway now for a local bonspiel to include 6 rinks each from Terrace Bay and Schreiber and 2 each from Red Rock and Marathon. Plans at present call for this 'spiel to be played off: Saturday afternoon and evening March 4th and morning afternoon and evening of Sunday March 5. Both Schreiber and Terrace Bay ice will be used with the various rinks shuttling back and forth.

The Club's second draw is well underway, with 15 rinks split into two groups - 8 in 'A' group and 7 in 'B' group. Each rink is curling three games a week and at the completion of this draw our own club bonspiel will be played (the week of Feb. 20th to March 3rd).
