## PENSION PLAN IS OUTLINED TO EMPLOYEES

Recently we were favoured with a visit from Bob Crikelair of Kimberly-Clark Corporation, during which he held meetings with various groups of employees to outline the LongLac Pension Plan. As Bob pointed out, the plan is identical to the one that is in effect at Kapuskasing and all that is required to put it into effect is ratification by the Department of National Revenue. When ratified, the effective date will be January 1, 1950.

## EXPANSION AT KAP

When the Kimberly-Clark Corporation was founded in 1872, one of the principles which the founders agreed to adhere to was "To expand capacity as demand for product justifies; to finance expansion out of earnings".

On February 21st, the Directors of the Corporation made it public that plans were ready for doubling the capacity of the Kimberly-Clark of Canada mill at Kapuskasing. The total cost will be upward of \$3,000,000.00 of which \$150,000.00 was earmarked for Townsite programme, additional housing, etc.

Co-incidentally, the Canadian Cellucotton Products Company, at Niagara Falls, Ont. is expecting to expand its converting operation there. When completed, additional employment of more than 100 persons will be required and will also mean that 95% of the creped wadding required will come from Kapuskasing. At present a large portion of the creped wadding required at Niagara Falls is being imported from the United States.
