CLEAN-UP WEEK Here are a few Spring Clean-Up suggestions:

(1) Clear Out Debris: Get rid of rubbish or anything combustible that you're not going to use in attics, closets, cellars, garages. Rubbish, such as old paper and rags, is a fire hazard. It not only starts fires itself, but furnishes fuel for fires starting from other causes. Clean these hazards out of your house, store or factory.

(2) Watch Outside Fires: Clean up your yard. Keep grass cut low around buildings. Never burn papers on a windy day when there's danger of sparks setting fire to your house, shrubbery, clothing or outbuildings. Use an incinerator wherever possible.

(3) Clear Out Paint and Oil Rags: Destroy rags or keep in closed metal containers; hang up mops and paint-soiled clothing so air can circulate around them. Paint or oil-soaked rags heat up from chemical action, burst into flames. Clean up after painting jobs.

(4) Check Your Fuses: Use 15 ampere fuses in regular household circuits, and don't put pennies behind blown fuses; keep wiring in good repair; have all work done by an expert electrician. Fuses protect your appliances, your house and your family from damage and possible fire when wires are overloaded or a short circuit occurs.
