REGULATIONS REGARDING CUTTING IN WOODLOT

A woodlot has been opened up in an area about

3/4 of a mile east of the mill by a road which

follows a westerly route from a point on Highway 17 just north of the overpass. This area has been set aside as an area for the procurement of fire wood by the residents of Terrace Bay.

The following regulations must be adhered to: 1-Prior to any cutting, a permit must be obtained. Applications for permits may be obtained at the Administration Office care of Miss Wynne Marshall.

2-All slash accumulated from such cutting shall be neatly piled in a clear space where it can be later burned. DO NOT BURN ANY SLASH NOW!!! Burning permits and instructions will be given later.

3-Normal rules of the Department of Lands and Forests with respect to cutting MUST be followed and you will be held responsible for seeing that the area is properly cleaned up and that stumps left are no higher from the ground than the stump diameter.

For any further information regarding cutting rights and Department of Lands and Forests regulations in this matter, contact any of the volunteer fire wardens or the Fire Chief.
