During the six month period from
July 1st to December 31st, 1950, the Northwestern Branch of the Ontario Pulp and
Paper Makers' Safety Association operated
its first Inter-Mill Safety Contest with
ten mills involved.

Victors in the contest were abitibi
Power and Paper Company, Fort William.
During the contest period they worked
323,624 hours with just one two-day accident
for a frequency rate of 3.09 and a limited
severity of .006. LongLac ended up in the
2nd rung with 2 accidents and 20 lost working
days during 702,062 man hours for a 2.84
frequency rate and .028 severity rate. The
contest was based on Limited Severity.

Commencing February 1st, a new contest will get underway, this time based on Frequency Rate. It also will last for a 6-month period.
