BEWARE OF CHIMNEY FIRES

February is the heart of the chimney fire season.

Chimney fires give firemen concern at all times. There is always danger from flying sparks, as well as the possibility that the fire may spread around the roof and other parts of the building, especially in old buildings with cracked and settled chimney walls.

There are certain good reasons for attending to chimney fires immediately, even though a well constructed chimney should be able to burn itself clean without setting fire to the rest of the house. If it is allowed to burn too long, it may crack and unless the cracks are discovered and repaired after the fire, the chimney may immediately become a serious menace to the house. When a chimney is thoroughly dirty, but otherwise in good condition, a fire may cause it to plug itself up with loosened soot and do a lot of smoke damage to the building.
