NEW BOOKS FOR THE LIBRARY

MUSIC OF THE WORLD (A History) by Kurt Pahlen. A splendid up-to-the-minute account of music through the ages by one of the world's foremost musicologists.

THY PEOPLE, MY PEOPLE by Elizabeth Hoemberg. An account of the author's life in Germany before, during and after the 2nd World War. Elizabeth Hoemberg was born in Canada of English-Canadian parents, and in 1938 married a German historian, Dr. Albert Hoemberg and went with him to Germany. The whole story builds itself into a narrative notable for the fine sense of political atmosphere possessed by Elizabeth Hoemberg.
