THESSALON, ONT. Mrs. Arthur McAlpine, 41, suffered fatal burns in an unsuccessful attempt to rescue chickens from a burning coop at her home near here Saturday. The woman was discovered by her father and rushed to the Provincial Cross hospital on a passing truck. A Provincial Police Constable said that the fire apparently started while Mrs. McAlpine was burning paper rubbish. The victim's hair and clothes were completely burned off.
