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KNOW YOUR BENEFIT PLANS

Continuing with our outline of group insurance, most employees carry it while on our payroll only, and as such it constitutes a very low-cost term insurance coverage. When an employee leaves, however, regardless of physical condition, he can convert his policy into any form of regular insurance at regular insurance rates; i.e.—endowment, straight life, 20-pay life, etc. No medical examination is necessary, but the employee would have to pay the same rate for the policy as he would pay for a policy taken out at the age he is when leaving the Company's employ.
