In addition to the 188 pupils registered here, Terrace Bay has approximately another 23 pupils who will journey daily into Schreiber to attend the Continuation School there.

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LONGLAC RECEIVES SAFETY TROPHY

Last Thursday night at a banquet in the Prince Arthur Hotel, Port Arthur, a trophy was presented to LongLac Pulp and Paper Company by the Mill Manager of the Port Arthur Division of Abitibi Power and Paper Co., F. R. Brown. The trophy, received by F. O. Soughton, LongLac's Services and Safety Supervisor, was won by LongLac in an 11-Mill Safety Contest sponsored by the Northwestern Branch of the Ontario Pulp and Paper Makers' Safety Association. The banquet marked the closing of the quarterly meeting of the Branch with the Abitibi Co. as hosts. In winning the trophy, LongLac experienced only one disabling injury during the 6-month period of the contest for a frequency rate of 1.41. In second spot was Abitibi - Fort William, with one accident for a 3.03 frequency rate. Awarded the "White Elephant" for the poorest showing in the Contest was the Brompton Mill at Nipigon with a frequency rate of 49.68.

A new contest, involving the same 11 mills which will run for a 6 month period, got under way on September 1st.

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LONGLAC LEADS KAP

At the end of eight months (to September 1st) LongLac is leading the Spruce Falls Mill at Kapuskasing in a safety contest based on National Safety Council standards. During the contest, Kap has had 14 accidents for a frequency rate of 5.5 while LongLac's disabling injuries have been held down to 3 for a 3.2 frequency rate. With four months to go, we must do everything possible to hold accidents to an absolute minimum. We don't want the goat back which was taken to Kap because they came out 2nd best last year.
