New 6th Series bonds are better than ever. They can be cashed at any time at any bank for full face value plus earned interest to the last day of the preceding month. This new feature has a lot of merit. Every member of a family may hold up to the new \$5000.00 limit. Each bond carries 10 interest coupons worth  $3\frac{1}{2}\%$  of the bonds value. The first coupon becomes due August 1, 1953 and one each August for the following 9 years.

At Terrace Bay, 6th Series Canada Savings Bonds will be available on a "Payroll Savings Plan" basis and all employees will be contacted.
