## LIBRARY RE-OPENS MOND Y

The Library has now been moved to new quarters which, in every respect, are much more desirable than the old location in the South Camp. A portion of the space formerly occupied by the Improvement District has been set aside as a Library and the necessary renovation and re-decorating is nearing completion.

This Library opened in February, 1950 and by the end of December of that year there were almost 400 books on the shelves. By the end of June of this year, this total had increased to almost 600.

All of the progress that the library has made to date is due to the amount of honest effort that the volunteer members of the Board have put into their work. Mrs. J. Shaunessy is Chairman of the dvisory Board with Eleanor Pearson as Secretary. Rev. Lavender and Joe Heenan are the other members of this Board. H. C. Laundy is Chairman of the Terrace Bay Public Library Board and Frank Strutt is Secretary Treasurer. Willing and officient service is dispensed at all times by the Librarian, Mrs. Ellen Hodgkiss.
