Conservation is your business.

At the meeting of our local Conservation Club held on Monday last, a number of subjects were discussed which are of interest to ALL who enjoy Canadian wild life.

Conservation Officer, Ted Davis, spoke briefly on a study of deer and moose being conducted this year by Ontario Fish and Game authorities. To further this study, Mr. Davis has urged that all deer jaw-bones be surrendered to the Ontario department of Lands and Forests. To facilitate means, you may contact any member of the Conservation Club right here in Terrace Bay and the matter will pass through organized channels. Please remember the date and location of your success and that while this is merely a request, good hunting may be assured in later years.

As a point of interest to attending members, several films were shown on the habits and habitats of our wild game. The struggle our Caribou must face to survive; and "Pheasant Island" as Pelee Island has been dubbed because if its famous pheasant populace, were both entertaining and instructive.

To all who hunt and fish in this district, we request that your co-operation and consideration be given to a plan formulated to conserve our game. Two Deputy Game Wardens will be appointed from the members of the Conservation Club. These men will do a task that will bring no remuneration and little gratitude for time spend doing a hard job. While this undertaking could be pleasant; experience has shown that no man or group of men can strive to enforce justice and common sense without "locking horns" with the unruly few. As a group, men are inclined to be reasonable and fairly conservative in business or pleasure. Once this group has broken down into a horde of individual hunters, may become "trigger happy", blood thirsty characters who maim and kill all that cross their path. There is no logical reason for this "Jekyll and Hyde" complex except that in some cases the veneer applied by civilized reason is rather thin and is penetrated easily by the tang of forest air. To protect our wildlife; to protect these people from themselves; and to protect the innocent hunter, something must be done. Please co-operate.

Remember that as friends and associates in a small district you are asking a friend to prosecute you when you break game laws.

Remember that safety is something to take with you when you go hunting. An empty gun is always the killer and innocent orphans pay the penalty.
