

RECORDS FALL IN ALL DIRECTIONS IN 10-PIN LEAGUE

Just to give those individuals something to think about, we are taking the liberty of reprinting an editorial that appeared in the Bowmanville Statesman.

"THERE'S DYNAMITE IN THIS"

The Bowmanville Statesman has raised an issue which should set all married men thinking. Noting that the five-day working week is rapidly becoming the accepted thing for people employed in business, the Statesman points out that the housewife's week is very different. "Meals must be prepared, with the inevitable drudgery of dishwashing seven days a week, and 52 weeks a year. She gets no holidays with pay."

There is, it seems, no Housewives' Union to demand shorter hours of labor, higher wages, and double pay for overtime. But men, you never can tell; it might happen. The women wanted the vote--and got it. If they want a five-day week, they may get that, too. It may even be made part of the wedding covenant. And it isn't as if domestic help were readily or cheaply available to serve in the housewife's leisure hours. Men will simply have to get used to cooking the meals and changing the baby's diapers during the off-work time of their helpmeets. A five-day week? What if the housewives choose different "days off" to those of their husbands--days when the husbands are not at home to do the cooking? That will further complicate matters. But there's no certainty that they won't do it.
