

EAST GERMANY ESCAPEE SPEAKS TO KIWANIS CLUB

Inge Kerrinnis of Frankfurt, Main, Germany, was the speaker at the last regular Tuesday Kiwanis meeting at the Hotel. She has been in Canada only since May 5th but with a surprising command of English she related some of her experiences in Germany during the war and through the postwar period. She was educated as a teacher and recently worked for the occupation forces in Germany where she acquired her facility with English. Her father is an architect.

During the war, her family, with the exception of her father, who was an allied prisoner, were caught in East Germany when the Russians overran that section. She escaped from a Russian internment camp, however, and later, after the war, her father rescued her and her family from the Red zone and brought them into West Germany.

She related some of her impressions of the life in both East and West Germany and how the Churches are forbidden in the East zone and how teachers in West Germany must have up to eight years of college to be able to teach while teachers in East Germany are only required to take a six months course.

She stated that she considered herself very lucky to have been able to come to Canada and that there were many in Germany who would welcome the opportunity to follow her here. She hopes to arrange to get her family over sometime in the future.

She explained that although her father is a professional man he does not earn enough to support the five in her family and that it is necessary for her whole family to work, including her mother. At the conclusion of her talk, she answered questions from the Club touching on the political situation, etc.
