## GOLF DRIVING RANGE

Last year, the Golf Driving Range was completed by some of Terrace Bay's civic minded citizens. They spent a considerable amount of time and effort (in conjunction with the Company, who contributed the materials and equipment) to get the Range into operation.

This year, the Range was made ready for play during the month of June and the Recreation Committee hired an attendant on the basis of him keeping all receipts in return for his services. The Committee also budgeted \$100.00 to be held for the purchase of new balls, clubs, etc., but to date are holding this in reserve until the need arises. Prices were reduced this year to the present level of : first 25 balls - .25; second 25 balls - .20 & all additional at .15 per 25 balls.

Despite all of this, we are not getting enough participants to warrant keeping the Range open. The total receipts for Monday & Tuesday of this week were .95. That, of course, is not enough to keep the attendant interested and indicates such a lack of enthusiasm that further subsidization by the Committee is not warranted. In short, unless interest picks up we may be forced to close the Range.

## KIWANIS CLUB

Officers of the Kiwanis Club of Terrace Bay today announced that Bill Borsum represented the club at the 37th annual convention of Kiwanis International, June 15-19 at Seattle, Wash.

The delegates elected International officers acted on amendments to the Kiwanis International Constitution and By-Laws, and passed on resolutions presented to the convention.

Headlining the convention speaking program were eminent business, political, professional & religious leaders.

John G. Diefenbaker, member of the Canadian Parliament at Ottawa, addressed the huge delegation in Seattle's Civic Auditorium at the All-Kiwanis Night meeting. He is one of Canada's top orators and an expert on national affairs.

Tuesday morning, Theodore R. McKeldin, Governor of the State of Maryland, and James M. (Jimmy) Fidler, Hollywood commentator, also spoke. Governor McKeldin has won national recognition for his administrative abilities and political reforms. Fidler is president of National Kid's Day Foundation and spoke on the highly successful annual Kid's Day sponsored by 3,500 Kiwanis clubs on the fourth Saturday of each September.

More than 10,000 Kiwanians and their families viewed a glittering dramatic production in a huge pavilion on the University of Washington campus.

As a delegate from the Terrace Bay club Bill convened with fellow Kiwanians from every state in the Union, Canadian provinces, and the territories of Alaska, Hawaii, and the Yukon. The convention was one of the largest in the history of the international community service organization.
