DON'T FOOL WITH FIRE

Police and firemen said a pan of wax which Batten had been warming had "blown up in his face."

District Fire Chief Tom Armstrong said the flying paraffin was hot enough to burn a set of plastic curtains six feet from the stove. "Nothing was left of the curtains, and a window pane was melted right through," he said.
