Last year, during the period from January 9th to July 21st here at Terrace Bay, LongLac employeesworked 192 consecutive safe days for a safe man hour total of 728,825.

As we go to press today, our safe day total is 104 and safe man hours are near-

ing the 400,000 mark.

To provide an added incentive to all as we endeavour to better our best previous record, Mill Manager D.C. Porter has announced that another Community Safety Party will be staged on completion of 750,000 safe man hours instead of 1,000,000 hours as previously indicated. The 750,000 hour objective ought to be reached about mid-October if we continue to operate without a disabling injury.

And just a word about another objective. Last year, with 5 disabling injuries during the year, we had a frequency rate (accidents per million man-hours worked) of 3.48. We set an objective for 1952 of a frequency rate of not more than 2.50. Todate our rate is 2.85 and it will take all of our efforts to end up the year at the 2.50 rate or less as we can afford only one more disabling injury this year if this objective is to be achieved. So let's do all we can by continuing to prevent accidents; By doing so we will reach our goals:
