Set up, to assist the Board, is an Advisory Committee, composed of voluntary members, whose biggest job is that of seeing that the proper type of literature finds its way onto the shelves at the Library. In 1951, Mrs. J. O. Shaunessy was Chairman of the Committee, ably assisted by Eleanor Pearson as Secretary along with Rev. A. F. Lavender, Pat Dooling and Joe Heenan as Executive members. Serving on the 1952 Committee, are Joe Heenan as Chairman, Eleanor Pearson again as Secretary and Pat Dooling and John Wade as members. H. C. Laundy represents the Imp. Dist. Trustees on this Committee as an ex-officio member. Librarian's duties are in the very capable hands of Mrs. Ellen Hodgkiss.

Each year a budget is set-up to care for the year's needs. This budget is carefully administered and the funds to operate it come in the form of grants from both the Imp. District Board of Trustees and the Provincial Government, to which are added the fines collected from borrowers on overdue books.
