facilities was carried out as well as weekly inspection of bunkhouses and snack bar.

With the assistance of Mr. Hugh MacDonald, Provincial Sanitary Inspector, all food stores as well as the local hotel and restaurant were inspected and a report of findings made with recommendations for improvements required.

Samples of water from the municipal supply have been sent to the Provincial Laboratories at intervals with no sample showing lower than grade A.

Garbage collection and disposal as well as disposal of sewerage are accomplished in a sanitary manner.

During the summer, the swimming and wading pools were inspected and samples of the swimming pool tested with good results."
