We had our animated Pet Parade at the first of the season and a Doll and Stuffed Animal Parade at the end of August. We had scavanger Hunts, dancing, First-Aid instruction, sing-songs and Corn Trails as well as a picnic for the younger children. All of these things provided a great deal of healthy, educational and interesting FUN: We are reminded that Joseph Lee, Playground originator, said: "If the boy does not do daring things and does not measure himself against other boys in games and contests, he will never grow to be a man.
