After the service we walked to Westminster Abbey to see the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier just inside the Great West Door. Each regiment had been allotted a square on the lawn outside the Abbey which contained poppies, and wooden crosses bearing the names of those servicemen killed during the wars.

There is nothing quite so thrilling as sitting in the midst of an expectant theatre crowd waiting for the performance - gradually the lights dim; the conductor in evening clothes comes into the orchestra pit, takes his bow and begins the overture; the curtain goes up on a brightly lit stage. So were our most enjoyable evening spent in London at the Old Vic, Covent Gardens, the Festival Hall or one of the lesser known but numerous London theatres. There we saw a great many plays, ballets and musical performances - and to mention just a few - Noel Coward in the "Appelcart" Myra Hess, Moira Shearer in "Gisele" Margot Fonteyn, Lawrence Olivier and Vivien Leigh in the "Sleeping Prince", Jussieu Bjerling and many others.
