RECIPE OF THE WEEK

DATE AND NUT LOAF

Butter a loaf pan (about 5 by 10 inches top inside measure) and flour lightly.

Sift then measure -- 3 cups Monarch Pastry Flour

Add -- 4 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt

Sift together once then sift into a bowl

Stir in -- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup granulated sugar
1 cup chopped pitted dates
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup coarsely chopped nutmeats

Beat well -- 1 egg

Stir in -- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup milk
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup corn syrup
 $\frac{1}{3}$ cup orange juice
2 tablespoons shortening melted.

Make a well in the dry ingredients and add the liquids all at once; combine the mixtures lightly but thoroughly.

Turn batter into prepared loaf pan.

Bake in a moderate oven, 350°, about 1 hour.

Serve cold, sliced and buttered.

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HOW TO LAUNDRY NEW FABRIC BLENDS

So many of the prettiest new fabrics are blends this year - blends of the newer synthetic fibers like Orlon, Dynel and Acrilan. Many of these blends can be washed successfully - but it is important to know how.

Whether you buy a dress made of a blended fabric or make yourself one, its good news that you'll be able to wash them when the time comes. Many blended fabrics are washable and many are combinations of the new synthetic fibers. Care of these can be easy

if you'll remember two simple facts:

First, most blends are sensitive to heat so whether you hand- or machine-wash them, use warm, not hot water. Some blends are benefited by drying in a dryer if it is set at low temperature; some must dry naturally. For ironing use rayon setting.

Second, some blends will wrinkle badly if water extraction is improperly done so wring gently or if machine washed use a shorter extraction time.

Last but not least, save labels and follow washing directions.
