KIWANIS CLUB NEWS

On Tuesday, March 16th, at the regular meeting of the Kiwanis Club of Terrace Bay a letter addressed to the Club was read by Vice-President, M.O. Nelson. This letter was from the Unitarian Service Committee of Canada 48 Sparks Street, Ottawa 4, Ontario, and read partly as follows:

"At present, we are appealing for \$100,000 to feed the starving youngsters of Korea. Under our "Barley for Korea" program 125,000 children will be given a daily bowl of Canadian Barley gruel during the three hungriest months. Sixteen carloads of barley are now Korea-bound, but another eight must be shipped if we are to fulfil our pledge. Unfortunately, we are still tragically short of \$25,000 to purchase the remaining barley. Unless it is raised immediately, many children in Korea will starve to death before spring".

The Terrace Bay Kiwanis Club members agreed to personally donate money for this great cause and also to match this collection from the Club's Welfare fund. Other interested groups in Terrace Bay may also wish to contribute to this cause.
